The first Easter was an incredible day, one that started with disbelief, with fear and trembling and bewilderment beside the empty tomb, and ended with astonishment, excitement and thanksgiving.

When Jesus died, the hopes of the disciples and other followers died, their convictions died, indeed their faith died and they huddled in the upper room where they had celebrated the Last Supper hiding there in fear of being captured by the authorities and be subjected to torture as they had done to their Master, Jesus.

What is striking about the first Easter day is that the Church is founded not only on the proclamation of Peter that Jesus is the messiah, but also on the testimony of the women who brought the news of the rising of Jesus! With resurrection, their faith was made strong, the dead convictions came back to life and the lost hopes were restored. It is because of the resurrection; the disciples came out of the locked room with courage and tenacity to lay down their lives. Jesus is the Lord of the living and the dead. St Paul says that "Christ died for our sins according to the scriptures, that he was buried, and that he was raised on the third day - also according to the Scriptures.

Brother and Sisters in faith - The resurrection is the most important thing that we believe in as Christians. The resurrection is the centre of our faith, it is the foundation of our Christian experience, and it is the goal towards which our lives move. We are promised that what we believe will make a difference to us --- And indeed it does...

A story is told that in Russia a few years ago, a railway worker accidentally locked himself in a refrigerator car. Unable to escape or to attract attention, he resigned himself to his fate. As he felt his body becoming numb, he took a pencil out of his pocket and recorded the story of his approaching death. He scribbled on the walls of the car: "I am becoming colder... still colder... I am slowly freezing... half asleep - these may be my last words. When the car was opened, the man was found dead, but the temperature of the car was only about 56 degrees. Officials found that the freezing mechanism was out of order and that there was plenty of fresh air available. Although there was no physical reason that they could find for the man had died. It was concluded that he had died because he had believed that he would die.

We live in a world that is not quick to believe. There are so many things which occupy our thoughts and time, preoccupations and running after fame, power, importance and inordinate desire to have massive wealth or sophistications that do not lend themselves to belief in God. Many of the worldly things keep people locked into themselves which destroy true freedom, defeat growth in virtue and blind one to eternity.

This long year has felt like we have been locked in – not just restricted to our homes because of the pandemic. Locked in because we can't break a habit; are confined by a sickness or disability; the death of a loved one can cast a Good Friday shadow over the rest of our lives; the natural world is crumbling into an environmental Good Friday; nations are tearing themselves up with forces even within their own borders. We can feel locked up in a "Good Friday world," without an easy escape device to get us out. There is no quick and easy escape device for us from a lot of the situations we are in these days. But because of what God did for Jesus, we believe God can also do for us; maybe not instantly, but step-by-step, from the dark of any tomb, little by little into the light of Easter Sunday. Good Friday may continue for us for a while, but today reminds us that God has won the final victory. (Source acknowledged)

Let us believe it and live our life in the light of the resurrection, for Good Friday is not for ever, but Easter is for ever!

A man's daughter had asked the local minister to come and pray with her father. When the minister arrived, he found the man lying in bed with his head propped up on two pillows. An empty chair sat beside his bed. The minister assumed that the old fellow had been informed of his visit. "I guess you were risk bed. The minister assumed that the old reliow had been informed of his visit. Tiguess you were expecting me," he said. "No, who are you?" said the father. The minister told him his name and then remarked, "I see the empty chair; I figured you knew I was going to show up." "Oh yeah, the chair," said the bedridden man. "Would you mind closing the door?" Puzzled, the minister shut the door. "I have never told anyone this, not even my daughter," said the man. But all of my life I have never known how to pray. At church I used to hear the pastor talk about prayer, but it went right over my head." "I abandoned any attempt at prayer," the old man continued, "until one day about four years ago my best friend said to me, Johnny, prayer is just a simple matter of having a conversation with Jesus. Here is what I suggest. "Sit down in a chair; place an empty chair in front of you, and in faith see Jesus on the chair. It's not spooky because he promised, "I'll be with you always." "Then just speak to him in the same way you're doing with me right now." "So, I tried it and I've liked it so much that I do it a couple of hours every day. I'm careful though. If my daughter saw me talking to an empty chair, she'd either have a nervous breakdown or send me off to the funny farm." The minister was deeply moved by the story and encouraged the old man to continue on the journey. Then he prayed with him, anointed him with oil, and returned to the church.

Two nights later the daughter called to tell the minister that her daddy had died that afternoon. "Did he die in peace?" he asked. "Yes, when I left the house about two o' clock, he called me over to his bedside, told me he loved me and kissed me on the cheek. When I got back from the store an hour later, I found him dead. But there was something strange about his death. Apparently, just before Daddy died, he leaned over and rested his head on the chair beside the bed. What do you make of that?"

The minister wiped a tear from his eye and said, "I wish we could all go like that."

#### St Casilda **Feast Dav:**

9 April

Some saints'

names are

far more familiar to us than others, but even the lives of obscure holy persons teach us something.

And so it is with Saint Casilda. Her father was a Muslim leader in Toledo, Spain, in the 10th century. Casilda was a devout Muslim but was kind to Christian

prisoners. She became ill as a young woman but did not trust that any of the local Arab doctors could cure her. So she made a pilgrimage to the shrine of San Vicenzo in northern Spain. Like so many other people who made their way there-many of them suffering from hemorrhages—Casilda sought the healing waters of the shrine. We're uncertain what brought her to the shrine, but we do know that she left it relieved of illness

In response, she became a Christian and lived a life of solitude and penance not far from the miraculous spring. It's said that she lived to be 100 years old. Her death likely occurred around the year 1050.

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
