Fear can paralyse—whether that fear is based in reality or whether it exists only in our own mind

“Do not be afraid; just have faith” (Mark 5:36). These four words, “Do not be afraid,” are spoken countless times throughout Scriptures. Fear results from various causes. The perception of some immediate threat causes sudden fear as a sort of defence mechanism. In fact, this could save our life if, for example, the immediate threat is a car swerving into our lane. Sudden fear compels us to take action and avoid a collision. However, fear can also result from other more remote factors that we experience as threats to our well-being. For example, one may struggle with fear over an economic downturn or loss of profit in a business especially now in the midst of Covid19. The fear may be, “How will I support my family?” Or one may have health issues and this causes increasing fear about the future, or a couple may go through rough patches in their married life which raises fear over the future of their children and of themselves. And the list could go on. Though some forms of fear are healthy (swerving to avoid a car accident), most others are not. Some fears do great damage to a person’s ability to stay calm, remain focused and think clearly. Most often, fear causes anxiety and worry, leading one to lose trust in God and His providence, and that’s why the Scriptures speak so directly regarding this important spiritual point. Fear must give way to faith and trust in God.

The boat was small and the storm was really huge, and any moment they were going to be drowned. But the man sat silently, calm and quiet, as if nothing was happening.

The woman was trembling and she said, “Are you not afraid?”. This may be our last moment of life! It doesn’t seem that we will be able to reach the other shore. Only some miracle can save us; otherwise death is certain. Are you not afraid? Are you mad or something? Are you a stone or something?

The man laughed and took the sword out of its sheath. The woman was even more puzzled: What was he doing? Then he brought the naked sword close to the woman’s neck, so close that just a small gap was there, it was almost touching her neck.

He said, “Are you afraid?” She started to laugh and said, “Why should I be afraid? If the sword is in your hands, why should I be afraid? I know you love me”. He put the sword back and said, “This is my answer. I know God Loves me, and the storm is in His hands.” (Anonymous)

The first reading of this Sunday speaks about the prophet Jeremiah who was sent by God to change the hearts of the Chosen People and their leadership five centuries before the coming of Christ. Turning a deaf ear to him, the people began to frustrate him with torments and persecutions. Jeremiah was tempted to relinquish the entrusted mission, but he trusted God and remained steadfast in being the voice of God to the people [Jer. 20:13]. Jesus in today’s gospel encourages us to place our trust in God who does not want destruction but development and peace in all sorts of ways and He urges to have trust in the people as well who truly care for us.

Life is not predictable. There are ups and downs in our journey. Many of us want to trust God. When times are good, it can feel easier. But when times feel difficult, it is even more important to trust God. God’s unchanging character can give us a firm foundation when things feel unsteady and uncertain. The fear of the coronavirus and its economic and other related consequences overpower us or cause us to fear and despair. The Scriptures for this Sunday invite us not to give up our trust in God come what may in our way. The abiding presence of God with us produces a supernatural confidence and trust in the midst of any and every struggle we face.

First Reading (Jeremiah 20: 10-13)


Jeremiah said:

'I hear so many disparaging me, "Terror from every side! Denounce him! Let us denounce him!"
All those who used to be my friends watched for my downfall,
"Perhaps he will be seduced into error. Then we will master him and take our revenge!"
But the Lord is at my side, a mighty hero; my opponents will stumble, mastered, confounded by their failure;
everlasting, unforgettable disgrace will be theirs.
But you, Lord of Hosts, you who probe with justice, who scrutinise the loins and heart,
let me see the vengeance you will take on them, for I have committed my cause to you.
Sing to the Lord, praise the Lord, for he has delivered the soul of the needy from the hands of evil men.'

Responsorial Psalm (Ps 68: 8-10. 14. 17. 33-35. R. v.14)

(R.) *Lord, in your great love, answer me.*

1. It is for you that I suffer taunts, that shame covers my face,
that I have become a stranger to my brothers, an alien to my own mother's sons.
I burn with zeal for your house and taunts against you fall on me. (R.)
2. This is my prayer to you, my prayer for your favour.
In your great love, answer me, O God, with your help that never fails:
Lord, answer, for your love is kind; in your compassion, turn towards me. (R.)

Second Reading (Romans 5: 12-15)

Sin entered the world through one man, and through sin death, and thus death has spread through the whole human race because everyone has sinned. Sin existed in the world long before the Law was given. There was no law and so no one could be accused of the sin of 'law-breaking', yet death reigned over all from Adam to Moses, even though their sin, unlike that of Adam, was not a matter of breaking a law.

Adam prefigured the One to come, but the gift itself considerably outweighed the fall. If it is certain that through one man's fall so many died, it is even more certain that divine grace, coming through the one man, Jesus Christ, came to so many as an abundant free gift.

Gospel Acclamation

Alleluia, alleluia! The Spirit of Truth will bear witness to me, says the Lord, and you also will be my witnesses. Alleluia!

Gospel (Matthew 10: 26-33)

Jesus instructed the Twelve as follows: 'Do not be afraid. For everything that is now covered will be uncovered, and everything now hidden will be made clear. What I say to you in the dark, tell in the daylight; what you hear in whispers, proclaim from the house-tops.

'Do not be afraid of those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul; fear him rather who can destroy both body and soul in hell. Can you not buy two sparrows for a penny? And yet not one falls to the ground without your Father knowing. Why, every hair on your head has been counted. So there is no need to be afraid; you are worth more than hundreds of sparrows.

'So if anyone declares himself for me in the presence of men, I will declare myself for him in the presence of my Father in heaven. But the one who disowns me in the presence of men, I will disown in the presence of my Father in heaven.'




Book Club is starting again via Zoom.

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
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
