What we have in us of the image of God is the love of truth and justice - Demosthenes

The COVID19 pandemic has brought to the surface both good and bad in humanity. The deep seated 'division' among human beings based on the phenotype, economic status, power and position, etc has shown its ugly head in these terrible and challenging times. I can't fathom the exploitation of the poor even in this terrible situation in several COVID stricken countries. This pandemic has been consistently teaching us valuable lessons to us such as 'Nothing can be so certain and absolute anymore'; "No one is indispensable and everyone can be flexible"; "Things can change suddenly and survival is about adaptability" and many more. The question is if we listen to these and change our lives. There are so many things taken as social, cultural and religious norms which are detrimental to the wholistic health of humanity. It is in this trajectory the readings of this Sunday highlight the nature of God and invite us to reflect His nature in our interdependent lives. Surely, God is just; but He is also outrageously generous and merciful at the same time. We do not get what we deserve. Rather God gives us more than we deserve.

The parable of the workers in the vineyard is rather startling. People who work an hour in the late afternoon are paid the same as those who work all day long. Obviously God doesn't think like we do. We think of justice in terms of what is fair, of what people deserve. So, we would say that the people who worked longer deserved more. But God doesn't see it that way. God thinks of justice in terms of people's dignity, their right to a decent life. The people who came late had the same right to a decent life as those who had worked all day, so they are all treated equally. Nothing is taken from anyone, but all are treated in accord with their dignity, their right to a decent life. Such is God's justice. "My thoughts are not your thoughts, nor are your ways my ways, says the Lord." God's generosity and mercy is beyond our comprehension for sure.

In a masterful book on grace, Piet Franssen suggests that we can test how well we understand God's grace by gauging our reaction to this story:

Imagine a man who during his whole life is entirely careless about God and morality. He's selfish, ignores the commandments, ignores all things religious, and is basically consumed with pursuing his own pleasure—wine, sex, and song. Then, just hours before his death, he repents of his irresponsibility, makes a sincere confession, receives the sacraments of the church, and dies inside that conversion.

What's our spontaneous reaction to that story? Isn't it wonderful that he received the grace of conversion before he died? Or, more likely: The lucky beggar! He got away with it! He got to have all that pleasure and still gets to go to heaven!

If we felt the latter emotion, even for a moment, we have never deeply understood the concept of grace. Rather, like the older brother of the prodigal son, we are still seeing life away from God's house as fuller than life inside God's house, are still doing the right things mostly out of bitter duty, and are secretly envying the amoral. But, if this is true, we must be gentle with ourselves. This is an occupational hazard for good, faithful persons. (Source: The Sunday Website at Saint Louis University)

The readings of this Sunday challenge us to be honest with ourselves and to adopt some of God's ways especially in this pandemic time. Our lives are to be founded on the law of love and not on the law of vindictive justice. We belong together under the bright umbrella of God's seeking love and we are still called to go out into his 'vineyard' (family, community and country) to tend, cultivate and harvest. He calls us to be a generous people.

Refugee Food Drive

The Northern Deanery needs your help

Matt. 25:35-45

I was hungry and you gave me food. I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me... "Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry and fed you or thirsty and gave you something to drink? And when was it that we saw you a stranger and welcomed you?"... "Truly I tell you just as you did it to one of the least of these... you did it to me."

Our refugees are in great need for basic non-perishable food. Most of the 97,000 people seeking asylum have no access to any form of safety net and many thousands of them have lost jobs in the past three months. COVID-19 has caused much casual work to evaporate leaving these people, who have no access to income support and many without access to Medicare, especially vulnerable.

"Displaced people offer us this opportunity to meet the Lord... You have to know in order to understand... be close in order to serve... to be reconciled, we need to listen... to grow, it is necessary to share..." (Pope) Franciscus



When: 27 September 2020

How: Drop goods at the church into the box.

Shopping List:

Cooking oil (vegetable/canola 750ml or 1 litre containers), Rice (Basmati is the most popular), Tinned chickpeas and kidney beans, Tinned diced tomatoes,

Breakfast cereal (Cornflakes are popular!) up to 500g packs, Condiments (honey, jam), Coffee (instant), Dried fruit (apricots, prunes, dates), Dried lentils (red or green)

Long life milk (1 litre containers), Noodles (instant)

Pasta (spaghetti, penne, spirals etc), Pasta sauce, Tea (black or green), Tinned or instant soup, Tinned corn

Tinned fish, Spices (chilli, curry powder, turmeric etc, small packets or bottles), Tinned fruit.

Other items: Deodorant (for men & women)

Shampoo, Nappies (for over 10kg babies only), Razors, Sanitary pads (no tampons), Shaving cream, Shower gel / body wash, Soap, Toothbrushes, Toothpaste.

TWO BROTHERS

ONCE THERE WERE two brothers who inherited their father's land. The two brothers divided the land in half and each one farmed his own section. Over time, the older brother married and had six children, while the younger brother never married.

One night, the younger brother lay awake. "It's not fair that each of us has half the land to farm," he thought. "My brother has six children to feed and I have none. He should have more grain than I do."

So that night the younger brother went to his silo, gathered a large bundle of wheat, and climbed the hill that separated the two farms and over to his brother's farm. Leaving the wheat in his brother's silo, the younger brother returned home, feeling pleased with himself. Earlier that very same night, the older brother was also lying awake. "It's not fair that each of us has half the land to farm," he thought. "In my old age my wife and I will have our grown children to take care of us, not to mention grandchildren, while my brother will probably have none. He should at least sell more grain from the fields now so he can provide for himself with dignity in his old age." So that night, too, he secretly gathered a large bundle of wheat, climbed the hill, left it in his brother's silo, and returned home, feeling pleased with himself.

The next morning, the younger brother was surprised to see the amount of grain in his barn unchanged. "I must not have taken as much wheat as I thought," he said, bemused. "Tonight, I'll be sure to take more." That very same moment, his older brother was also standing in his barn, musing much the same thoughts. After night fell, each brother gathered a greater amount of wheat from his barn and in the dark, secretly delivered it to his brother's barn. The next morning, the brothers were again puzzled and perplexed. "How can I be mistaken?" each one scratched his head. "There's the same amount of grain here as there was before I cleared the pile for my brother. This is impossible! Tonight, I'll make no mistake - I'll take the pile down to the very floor. That way I'll be sure the grain gets delivered to my brother." The third night, more determined than ever, each brother gathered a large pile of wheat from his barn, loaded it onto a cart, and slowly pulled his haul through the fields and up the hill to his brother's barn. At the top of the hill, under the shadow of a moon, each brother noticed a figure in the distance. Who could it be?

When the two brothers recognized the form of the other brother and the load he was pulling behind, they realized what had happened. Without a word, they dropped the ropes to their carts and embraced.


