Dear Sisters and brothers,

On behalf of our community, I would like to express my sincere thanks and gratitude to Fr Jessie who was with us for 10 months. We thank him for his service to our community through his pastoral and spiritual works. Now, the Bishop has appointed him as the assistant priest at St Nicolas of Myra Parish, Penrith. I wish him every good luck in his ministry over there. Let us keep him in our prayers that he may be a faithful servant of God wherever he goes.

We will have visiting priests to celebrate the Sacraments with us in the following months until we are given a resident assistant priest. May I, therefore, request you to welcome our pastors and show our appreciation for their support to our community.

Congratulations to all the children who will be ‘tasting the Lord’ in the Eucharist for the first time in their lives. Let us offer our special prayers for them and their families that they are united in the Sacrificial Love, Joy, and Peace of Jesus.

I would like to remind you again that the wearing of face masks is highly recommended during the celebration of the Mass and other sacraments for the safety and wellbeing of our community. Let us protect each other by protecting ourselves!

As we are approaching the end of the Liturgical Year, the readings of this Sunday and specifically the Gospel invite us to reflect the end of our lives. In the midst of uncertainties of the world affected by the pandemic, a follower of Christ cannot afford to be casual and unprepared for the moment.

In the Jewish culture of which the listeners and Jesus were a part, the custom was that the bride would wait with her bridesmaids, normally at the city gate, for the bridegroom to come and go to her house for the wedding feast. We must remember the conditions of travel then with no mobile phones that there would have been no way of knowing when the bridegroom would arrive. It would have been a great shame for the family of the bride not to be ready when the bridegroom arrived no matter how late it was.

Reflecting on the parable, one may think that it is unfair that the five foolish maids were excluded from the wedding simply because they forgot to bring sufficient oil for their lamps. In addition, why didn't the wise ones share some of their oil with them? Were they not guilty of rank selfishness? The parable is deeper than it seems. There is far more involved than a little lamp oil.

It should be quite clear that we are not talking about a momentary lapse of memory – forgetting to bring along some extra oil. What we are dealing with are two contrasting attitudes towards the wedding feast.

For the sensible women it was obviously the chance of a lifetime. It was something they really appreciated and for which they had prepared diligently. Here was a never-to-be-repeated opportunity to meet the bridegroom and get into the wedding feast. No way were they going to miss it.

For the foolish ones, I imagine it was a bit of fun. They tagged along merely out of duty or habit. Deep down, they really didn't care. Even so, they felt let-down when they didn't get in. But it was their whole attitude that was wrong, not just one little lapse of concentration or memory. In other words, they were not judged on one moment of their lives. The first five were ready, careful, and wise – all doers of the word. The second five were unprepared, careless, and foolish – mere hearers of the word.

Hence, we need to be the doers of the Word like the sensible women and merely the hearers of the Word like the foolish women in the parable. The oil here stands for our Faith (nourishing of our faith), our love and service for our fellow men and our life in the company of Jesus every day.

A story is told of an old and holy monk who was sweeping up the fallen leaves in the monastery grounds. A visitor saw him and asked, "What would you do, brother, if you knew that you were to die in ten minutes?" The old monk said, "I'd carry on sweeping." Because the monk has always been vigilant, he is ready to meet His Judge anytime.

In an emergency, there are some things we can borrow from others at short notice. But we can also say in the context of today's parable that the 'oil' of loving service is not transferable to others. In other words, our preparedness is something that is ultimately our responsibility.

The door was shut for the foolish women... not due to any partiality on the part of the bridegroom but because of the tardiness/delay of some in responding to the invitation.

The locked door means that access to Jesus is not automatic or to be altogether taken for granted. We need to ask for it and we need to make an effort to keep the oil of faith, hope, love and service burning bright. That is precisely the warning in today's parable - "Therefore, stay awake, because you do not know either the day or the hour." (*Source of this reflection is duly acknowledged*)

Let us give ourselves to slumber and procrastination!

Saint Martin of Tours

Feast Day:
11 November

A conscientious objector who wanted to be a monk; a monk who was maneuvered into being a bishop; a bishop who fought paganism as well as pleaded for mercy to heretics—such was Martin of Tours, one of the most popular of saints and one of the first not to be a martyr.

Born of pagan parents in what is now Hungary, and raised in Italy, this son of a veteran was forced at the age of 15 to serve in the army. Martin became a Christian catechumen and was baptized when he was 18. It was said that he lived more like a monk than a soldier.

He was ordained an exorcist and worked with great zeal against the Arians. Martin became a monk, living first at Milan and later on a small island. When Hilary was restored to his see following his exile, Martin returned to France and established what may have been the first French monastery near Poitiers. He lived there for 10 years, forming his disciples and preaching throughout the countryside.

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
