Advent is such a joyful time as we wait for God in our world and in our lives. We sense this joy in the first two readings for today, from the Prophet Baruch and from the Letter to the Philippians. Baruch tells us that Jerusalem will be named by God the peace of justice. Baruch looks into the future, much as we might, and longs for that time when there is peace because justice rules throughout all the earth. If we are not longing for such a time, then it will be difficult for us to understand the dreams and longings of the exiled people of Israel. We have to be positive and filled with hope as we hear the emergence of the omicron variant which seems to infuse an element of uncertainty and fear in us. The prophetic words of Baruch give us the hope for a better future even though the end of the pandemic is not in sight.

Advent is a time to renew our longings. We can desire God's presence in our lives and desire a good life for ourselves and for others. We can hope for cures for all the deadly diseases of our time. We can all desire a better economy for ourselves and for others. We can desire that all children who suffer will be freed from their suffering and know peace, joy and delight. These types of hopes and desires help us understand the longing of our spiritual ancestors to return to their own land and worship their own God.

Baruch looks into the future and sees that day and rejoices in it. He imagines Jerusalem as once more the centre of the world and filled with people who love God. How different our own world would be if each one of us yearned for God, sought God with all heart and soul and sought always to help others.

The Letter to the Philippians tells us of the author's longing for the good of those who have become followers of Jesus. He wants them to be able to discern what is truly of value. Again, we can ponder how different our world would be if everyone longed only for those realities that truly have value! Here comes the Prophet John the Baptist inviting us to prepare the way that our longings come real and true. He invites us to take a U turn in our lives. We should look at ourselves and regret what we should regret: our sins, our meanness, our minor faults and failings, our injustices and hurt of others.

"Oh, well, soap only works when it is applied." A soap manufacturer and a pastor were walking together down a street in a large city. The soap manufacturer casually said, "The gospel you preach hasn't done much good, has it? Just observe. There is still a lot of wickedness in the world, and a lot of wicked people, too!" The pastor made no reply until they passed a dirty little child making mud pies in the gutter. Seizing the opportunity, the pastor said, "I see that soap hasn't done much good in the world either; for there is much dirt still here, and many dirty people are still around." The soap man said, "Oh, well, soap only works when it is applied." And the pastor said, "Exactly! So it is with the gospel."



Let us not be foolish to believe that our longings will not be fulfilled and it will never happen. Let us not forget that the longing of our Lord is that humanity is fully alive. Hence, as we turn towards Him with trust and a repentant heart, we will be able to experience ineffable joy and peace. May our hearts be one with His in this time of Advent and may His Divine Mercy draw the world to Himself.

A teacher in New York decided to honour each of her seniors in high school by telling them the difference they each made. First, she told each of them how they had made a difference to her and the class. Then she presented each of them with a blue ribbon imprinted with gold letters that read, "Who I Am Makes a Difference." sat his boss down and he told him that he deeply admired him for being a creative genius. The boss seemed very surprised. As he left, he said, "Would you take this extra ribbon and pass it on by honouring somebody else?" That night the boss came home to his 14-year-old son and sat him down. He said, "The most incredible thing happened to me today. I was in my office and one of the junior executives came in and told me he admired me and gave me a blue ribbon for being a creative genius. He gave me an extra ribbon and

asked me to find somebody else to honour. As I was driving home tonight, I started thinking about whom I would honour with this ribbon and I thought about you. I want to honour you. My days are really hectic and when I come home, I don't pay a lot of attention to you. Tonight, I just wanted to let you know that you do make a difference to me. Besides your mother, you are the most important person in my life. You're a great kid and I love you!" The startled boy started to sob and sob, and he couldn't stop crying. He looked up at his father and said through his tears, "I was planning on committing suicide tomorrow, Dad, because I didn't think you loved me. Now I know you care. This is the happiest day I've known." The boss went back to work a changed man. He was no longer a grouch but made sure to let all his employees know that they made a difference. 

Saint : Nicholas

The absence of the "hard facts" of history is not necessarily an obstacle to the popularity of saints, as the devotion to Saint Nicholas shows. Both the

Eastern and Western Churches honour him, and it is claimed that after the Blessed Virgin, he is the saint most pictured by Christian artists. And yet historically, we

can pinpoint only the fact that Nicholas was the fourth-century bishop of Myra, a city in Lycia, a province of Asia Minor.

As with many of the saints, however, we are able to capture the relationship which Nicholas had with God through the admiration which Christians have had for him—an admiration expressed in the colourful stories which have been told and retold through the centuries. - Perhaps the best-known story about Nicholas concerns his charity toward a poor man who was unable to provide dowries for his three daughters of marriageable age. Rather than see them forced into prostitution, Nicholas secretly tossed a bag of gold through the poor man's window on three separate occasions, thus enabling the daughters to be married. Over the centuries, this particular legend evolved into the custom of gift-giving on the saint's feast. In the English-speaking countries, Saint Nicholas became, by a twist of the tongue, Santa Claus —further expanding the example of generosity portrayed by this holy bishop.
