

16th April 2023 2nd Sunday of Easter **Divine Mercy Sunday**

> Acts 2:42-47 1 Peter 1:3-9 John 20:19-31

"Once a man has truly experienced the mercy of God in his life he will henceforth aspire only to serve" Dietrich Bonhoeffer



The Second Sunday of Easter is celebrated as the Divine Mercy Sunday. The word 'mercy' is rooted in the Latin word 'misericordia' which in turn derives from two words: Misereri meaning "to have pity on" or "compassion for" and cor, meaning "heart". Mercy, therefore, carries the idea of having compassion on someone with all of one's heart and reaching out to them in action. When we pray, 'Have mercy on me, God!' We are actually asking God to have compassion on us, or to hold us in His loving-kindness. And more intimately, we are asking Him to re-create or rejuvenate us.

The first reading from the Acts of the Apostles is Mercy in action. There are two salient features which adorned the first Christian community namely Unity and generous sharing of all they had out of concern for others. The gospel is about the appearance of the Risen Lord to the disciples. The disciples of Jesus being afraid of the Jewish authorities locked themselves in the upper room. They were totally withdrawn from the rest of the society. Jesus brought them the message of peace and consolation which transformed or recreated them for better. Jesus gave them back their identity and mission... a "mercy mission'. The same mission is entrusted to us in this challenging time.

A priest in California was preparing to go to bed on a Sunday night after a busy day when the phone rang. It was a nurse at the hospital which was a couple of hours drive away. A man was dying. He was a Catholic and would "Father" come. The priest was reluctant because there was a storm raging outside. But he decided to go. Upon arrival he entered the room of the dying man. He introduced himself and was gruffly told to "go to hell." The conditions of the storm had worsened, so the priest decided he would hang around for a while. An hour later he approached the man again. "I am a Catholic priest. You are dying. Are you sure I can't help you in

any way?" Again, the man rebuked him, demanding that he be left alone. For some reason the priest decided he would try once more.

He waited another hour. Then he entered the room for the last time. To his surprise the man responded, "Well, I may as well tell you." Then he began to relate the story of his life. Forty years back he worked on a railway signals box. Everything was done manually in those days. It was Christmas time, and he had been drinking. When the train was approaching, he pulled the wrong lever. The train went down the wrong track and collided into a car as it was crossing the lines. A woman and her two children were killed instantly. He told the priest that from that day onwards he had lived with the guilt of that accident. He kept to himself, never married, and gave up on life. He lived in quiet despair. The priest, who had been listening very intently, asked him a few more questions about the date and time of the accident. Then he said to the dying man, "I want you to listen closely to me. You did not know this. But there was another little boy in that car. He lived. And when he grew up, he became a priest. And he is speaking with you right now! And I want you to know, I forgive you.'



That man, who had spent his whole life in such an awful prison of self-hate, guilt and self-recrimination, was able to hear from the priest the words of forgiveness that set him free. He was finally able to forgive himself as he heard the words of absolution from the priest, but also the words of forgiveness from the little boy who had lost his mother and siblings in an accident 40 years back. He died in peace...

Mercy does miracles; God's mercy always recreates us; rejuvenates us; divine mercy offers us hope, healing and power, inner strength to confidently move on in our lives. Throughout the gospels, we discover that mercy again and again:

- The blind man Bartimaeus received his sight at his appeal of mercy from Jesus. Jesus made him somebody in the society... The Canaanite woman cried out to Jesus on behalf of her daughter, "Lord, Son of David, have mercy on me. My daughter is tormented by a devil." And her daughter was freed (Mt 15:22).

 The ten lepers called to Jesus, "Jesus! Master! Have mercy on us." And they were cleansed (Lk 17:13).

 In the parable of the two men who went up to the Temple to pray, "the tax collector stood some distance away, not daring even to
- raise his eyes to heaven; but he beat his breast and said, "God, be merciful to me, a sinner" (Lk 18:10-14). The man went home justified and as a new man.

Those of us who are dogged by feelings of fear, hopelessness, anxiety, stress, depression, anger, hatred or stubbornness and guilt about past sins need to experience the undeserved mercy and forgiveness of God; we must first believe that our sins are forgiven; we must truly and sincerely make all the efforts to lead a new life renewed in the Spirit of God. It is in the mercy of Jesus; we find ourselves again. It is in His mercy, we find meaning or purpose for our life. (Sources duly acknowledged)

Christine Kingery will never forget her grandmother's stories. She shared some of them on the NPR series **This I Believe**.

Christine's Russian-born grandmother was captured by the Nazis and taken to a work camp in Germany when she was 17. They shaved off her waist-length hair and tortured her. She never saw her parents or siblings again. The resourceful young woman escaped the camp and worked for many months as a nurse in underground movements in Germany and Belgium until she was captured a second time by the Nazis and taken to a concentration camp. There she met Christine's grandfather, and the two escaped. Eventually, they and their newborn-daughter — Christine's mother — came to America.

Christine remembers hearing these stories when she was eight years old. She said to her grandmother, "I hate the Germans for what they did to you! Don't you just get so mad at them?"

Christine never forgot her grandmother's response. She said in her broken English, "The Germans are my friends. When I escaped and had nowhere to go, the Germans gave me food, shelter, and clothes. They were my friends even in the camps. The Germans are the kindest people I know."

Her answer shocked Christine. It was her first introduction to the meaning of compassion.

A few years later, when Christine was in high school, she had the chance to go to Japan. She visited Nagasaki. The experience was overwhelming. In every photograph, in every Japanese victim's face in the museum's exhibits, she saw her grandmother's reflection. Christine had to go outside to Peace Park on the bomb-site grounds. Beautiful colorful origami cranes — thousands of them — were draped over statues and trees. Christine sat on a bench and cried and cried. An old Japanese woman saw the teenager on the bench. She was about her grandmother's age. She sat next to Christine and put her wrinkled hands in Christine's. In broken English, the old woman said, "Peace starts right here. Peace starts with you and me. It starts today." (A connections sampler)

St Gianna Beretta Molla

Feast Day: 19 April In less than 40 years, Gianna Beretta Molla



became a pediatric physician, a wife, a mother and a saint! She was born in Magenta near Milano, the tenth of Alberto and Maria Beretta's 13 children. An active member of the St. Vincent de Paul Society and a leader in the Catholic Action movement. Gianna also enjoyed skiing and mountain climbing. She earned degrees in medicine and surgery from the University of Pavia, eventually specializing in pediatrics. In 1952, Gianna opened a clinic in the small town of Mesero, where she met engineer Pietro Molla. Shortly before their 1955 marriage, Gianna wrote to Pietro: "Love is the most beautiful sentiment that the Lord has put into the soul of men and women." In the next four years the Mollas had three children: Pierluigi, Mariolina, and Laura. Two pregnancies following ended in miscarriage. Early in her final pregnancy, doctors discovered that Gianna had both a child and a tumor in her uterus. She allowed the surgeons to remove the tumor but not to perform the complete hysterectomy that they recommended, which would have killed the child. Seven months later in April 1962, Gianna Emanuela Molla was born at the hospital in Monza, but postoperative complications resulted in an infection for her mother. The following week Gianna Molla died at home, and was buried in the cemetery of Mesero. Gianna Emanuela went on to become a physician herself, Gianna Beretta Molla was beatified in 1994 and canonized 10 years later. 
